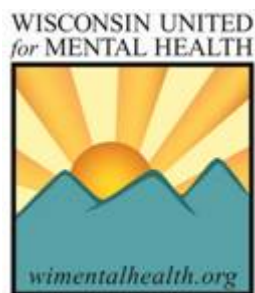

Majority of America's 2 Million Adolescents Suffering from Depression Episodes Did Not Receive Treatment in the Past Year

Adolescents without health insurance were less than half as likely to get treatment as those with Medicaid/Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) or private health insurance coverage.

A new report which coincides with Children's Mental Health Awareness Day reveals that 8.2 percent (2 million) youths aged 12 to 17 experienced at least one major depressive episode (MDE) in the past year. Only about two-fifths (38.9 percent) of these adolescents received treatment during this period according to the report by the Substance Abuse and mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

The report also found that health insurance coverage seemed to be a major factor in determining whether adolescents experiencing MDEs in the past year received treatment. Among these adolescents, those without health insurance coverage were far less likely to have received treatment (17.2 percent) than those with Medicaid/CHIP (42.9 percent) or private health insurance (40.6 percent).

The Thresholds Institute recently hosted a conference on **"Integrating Health Care to Increase Life Expectancy and Quality in Individuals with Severe Mental Illness."** The conference goals were to share research around basic science related to wellness (including metabolic disorders) and promising service models addressing the physical health care needs of persons living with severe mental illnesses; and to strengthen a coalition of scholars, advocates, consumers and providers who seek **to increase quality of life and longevity of life for persons with severe mental illness**. ●Video Highlights Use of Photovoice in Expressing Experience of Stigma

"Beyond the Shadows of Stigma" highlights works from a gallery showing produced by participants in the Photovoice course, **"Taking off the Blinders: A Project to Combat Stigma and Discrimination."** The 8-minute online video poignantly captures the essence of the Photovoice experience through interviews with participants and the works they created.

Photovoice puts cameras in the hands of individuals and asks them to produce statements made up of pictures and words that communicate their experience. This Photovoice course, developed as an intervention at the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at Boston University, **supports the personal empowerment of those living with serious mental illnesses in combating stigma**. ●Latina Teens and Suicide

Webinar: Understanding the Rise in Suicide Attempts in Latina Teens. The Center for Health and Health Care in Schools created a webinar to help shed light on the rising trend of suicides among Latina teens. The webinar, led by Luis H. Zayas, Ph.D., director of the Center for Latino Family Research at the George Warren Brown School of Social Work at Washington University in St. Louis, **will examine the high rate of suicide attempts** by adolescent Latinas in the United States. Webinar participants will learn:

- * the epidemiology and research on suicide attempts by adolescent Latinas in comparison to other ethnic and racial youth.

- * about the multiple factors (individual psychology, family, social, culture, gender) that come together in Latina teenagers' suicide attempts and examine preventive interventions that can be undertaken in schools and the importance of family-centered interventions.
